

Meditation

Meditation is a biblical practice. God commands his people to meditate. When Joshua was about to take the place of Moses and lead God's people, God told Joshua "...you shall meditate on [God's Word] day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in it." (Joshua 1:8 ESV)

Meditation is simply directing your mind to think about God, to concentrate on God and the things of God. Throughout Scripture, God's people meditated by setting their minds on...

- His mighty words
- His unfailing love
- His precepts
- His promises

When we meditate we focus on God and His word so we are able to listen well and hear God correctly.

Since you have been raised to new life with Christ, set your sights on the realities of heaven, where Christ sits in the place of honor at God's right hand.² Think about the things of heaven, not the things of earth. ³ For you died to this life, and your real life is hidden with Christ in God. ⁴ And when Christ, who is your life, is revealed to the whole world, you will share in all his glory. Colossians 3:1-4 (NLT)

How to Meditate...

- 1. Find a quiet place.
- 2. Try to quiet your soul.
- 3. Pick a passage of Scripture.

- 4. Slowly read through the passage at least three times.
- 5. Ask the Holy Spirit to guide you and help you hear what God is trying to say to you through the passage. Allow the Holy Spirit to show you how this passage applies to your life.
- 6. Leave some space to journal what you hear.

God designed us to live in relationships. We need each other. We cannot live the way Jesus expects us to without others.

We all have blind spots in our lives.

- Wrong actions that we justify
- Bad attitudes that hurt our relationships
- Thought patterns that have drifted off track
- Small compromises that we ignore

We all need someone to hold us accountable. An accountability partner speaks truth into our lives without beating us up, helps us stay on track as we grow in our faith, encourages us when we want to quit, and reminds us of biblical principles.

An accountability relationship provides us with a safe place to struggle and confess our sins.

Tips for finding an accountability relationship...

1. Ask God to help you find the right person to hold you accountable.

 - a. Is mature in their faith
 - b. Understands biblical principles
 - c. Will pray for you
 - d. Is objective
 - e. Wants you to grow in your faith
 - f. Is available
 - g. Is trustworthy
 - h. Is the same gender as you
- 3. Ask the person if they will be your accountability partner
- 4. Establish a routine meeting time

Victory in Jesus

Scripture Reading: Revelation 19:11-16

In Revelation 19, we are given a breathtaking glimpse of Jesus as the triumphant King. The chapter describes a vision of heaven opened, revealing Jesus riding on a white horse, His name "Faithful and True," and with justice, He judges and makes war. He wears many crowns, and His robe is dipped in blood—a vivid picture of His sacrifice and victory over sin and death. The armies of heaven follow Him, clothed in white linen, symbolizing the purity and righteousness that He alone provides to His people. Ultimately, the passage proclaims that Jesus is the "King of kings and Lord of lords," whose reign is unstoppable and eternal.

This powerful imagery reassures us that no matter how overwhelming life's battles may seem, the ultimate victory belongs to Jesus. As believers, we share in this victory. Romans 8:37 reminds us that we are "more than conquerors through Him who loved us." This truth empowers us to stand firm in our faith, knowing that the same Jesus who conquered death is leading us in triumph.

Victory in Jesus is not just about future glory; it is a present reality. Through His death and resurrection, we are set free from the power of sin and given the Holy Spirit to guide and empower us daily. Our struggles and challenges may persist, but they do not define us. Instead, we are defined by the victory Jesus has already won on our behalf.

When you face difficulties, remember the picture painted in Revelation 19. Jesus is not a distant Savior; He is a conquering King who fights for you and has already secured your eternal destiny. His victory ensures that every tear will be wiped away, every injustice will be made right, and every sorrow will be turned to joy. We fight from a place of victory, not for it. As you reflect on this passage, consider how the victory of Jesus transforms your perspective on life's challenges. Are there areas where fear or doubt have crept in? Surrender them to the One who is "Faithful and True." Let the assurance of His triumph fill you with hope, courage, and peace.

Prayer:

Lord Jesus, we praise You as the victorious King of kings and Lord of lords. Thank You for the victory You secured through Your death and resurrection. Help us to live in the confidence of that victory, trusting You in every battle we face. Strengthen our faith and fill us with Your peace, knowing that we are more than conquerors through You. Amen.

Reaping and Sowing Through Reading God's Word

Scripture Reading: Galatians 6:7-8; 2 Timothy 3:16-17

Shortcuts. On the highway of life, sometimes it's tempting to take them. But in our spiritual lives, sometimes shortcuts lead to shortcomings.

While the destination is important, the journey is what God uses to make us more like Him. Taking shortcuts often represents a desire to achieve spiritual growth quickly and easily with minimal effort. It may be linked to impatience, pride, or a lack of faith in the process itself. The result can be a spirituality without life transformation.

Spending time in God's Word consistently is one of the best ways to grow spiritually over the course of your life. Why is that?

First, what you read makes a difference in your life. The Bible shows us God's character and reveals who He is. In His Word, we see that He is holy, just, unchanging, gracious, faithful, and loving. Second, according to 2 Timothy 3:16-17, Scripture teaches us, guides us, corrects us, and trains us in righteousness. These things lead to wholeness and our being equipped for whatever life may bring. Third, spending consistent time in the Bible helps daily reorient our lives toward God so that we grow in spiritual maturity.

Reading Scripture is a primary spiritual discipline that pays huge dividends. Traveling the road of life with Jesus as our guide while bypassing tempting shortcuts will deepen our dependence on Him and show us both His heart and His ways. If you want to reap a spiritual harvest in your life, sow it with God's Word consistently!

Father, we acknowledge you as the sovereign Lord over all creation. Thank you for revealing Yourself to us in Your Word. Draw us to You and strengthen our desire to know You more deeply as we read Scripture so that we may love You more faithfully and serve You more effectively. In the name of Jesus we pray. Amen.

Confession

In 1 John 1:8 and 9, John says,

⁸ If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. ⁹ If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

All of us have sin and that sin needs to be dealt with. Today we are going to take some time to confess our sin to God.

Read through these prompts to help you recognize and acknowledge your sin...

- Desires of the flesh sensual things that God might say are unhealthy words, unhealthy pictures, unhealthy music, etc.
- Desires of the eyes material things that God would say lead you to covet what others have, long for more than you have, or make you unsatisfied with what you have
- Pride of life attitudes in God's sight such as wanting recognition or fame; thinking more highly of yourself than appropriate so that you are above serving others; taking credit for what God has done in your life; or longing to be looked at, admired, thought highly of by others, etc.

Confession—the repentant act of acknowledging one's sins to God with the belief that who Jesus is and what He did is sufficient for forgiveness.

Take some time this week to pray through and work through the prayer below...

Most merciful GOD, I confess that I have sinned against YOU in thought, word, and deed, by what I have done, and by what I have left undone. I have not loved YOU with MY whole heart; I have not loved

my neighbors as myself. I am truly sorry and I humbly **repent**. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on me and forgive me; that I may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

How to...

- Schedule at least 15 minutes to connect with God.
- Remove all distractions. Turn off your phone. Go to a quiet place.
- Pray the prayer above out loud.
- Then slowly go through it as many times as you need tointernalizing the words.
- As the Holy Spirit brings specific sins to your mind, confess them to Him.
- Imagine God wrapping His arms around you, looking you in the eyes, and saying, "You are forgiven."
- Close your time with God by saying a prayer of thanksgiving for His grace and forgiveness.

Freedom After Failure: Lessons from a Broken King

Thanksgiving

Scripture Reading: Luke 17:11-19

In Jesus' days, leprosy was a highly contagious skin disease. The symptoms of the disease could include white patches and oozing sores. It could also result in the loss of one's fingers and toes. Leprosy was painful.

Religiously, lepers were considered unclean. They could not go to the temple. Lepers could not participate in the religious traditions of the people.

In addition to the physical marks and the religious restrictions, a leper was considered a social outcast. When someone had leprosy they had to live isolated from their friends and family. They could not be around healthy people.

No handshakes. No high-fives. No hugs.

NO PHYSICAL CONTACT.

Since they could contaminate others, lepers had to declare their uncleanliness (Leviticus 13:45), "I am unclean! I am unclean! Don't come any closer. I am UNCLEAN!"

In Luke 17, the lepers cry out, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us." The cry was full of desperation, loneliness, hurt, and longing.

Jesus, who was on his way to Jerusalem to die on the cross for the sins of the world, slowed down to show compassion to these ten lepers. He displayed mercy by healing them physically which would permit them to come out of isolation, to reconnect with family and the faith community. Jesus met their need. Luke, in verses 15 and 16, describes what happened after the ten lepers were healed, "Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving him thanks."

One healed leper returned to praise God. One out of the ten went back to thank Jesus for healing. One out of ten. One!

As he did with the lepers, Jesus shows us compassion and meets our need. Our need is bigger than healing from a skin disease. We are contaminated by sin. We are broken. We are depraved. Jesus took our sin by dying on the cross in our place to rescue us from our sin and restore us to God.

We owe Jesus our praise.

We owe Jesus our gratitude.

We should all fall at the feet of Jesus and thank Him because He has healed us from our sin.

Prayer:

Jesus, I praise You! Thank You for Your sacrifice. Thank You for dying on the cross to pay off my sin debt. I am so sorry! Jesus, Savior, thank You for having mercy on me. Thank You for your grace. Thank You for your forgiveness. Thank You! There is no one. There is no thing like You. I worship You today!

Reflection Questions:

- 1. Are you more like the nine lepers that did not thank God or like the one that went back to thank Jesus for what He had done for them?
- 2. What words would you say to Jesus right now to thank Him for your forgiveness and salvation?
