FIRE WORKS!

It is hotter than a firecracker on the 4th of July here in Trussville! As I write to you today, I've just returned from serving for a few days alongside our Men on Mission in South Carolina. Given the circumstances for the rebuild of the church, fire is on my mind. For those of you who do not know, the Camp Creek Baptist Church in Taylors was destroyed by fire when the steeple was struck by lightning on July 2, 2023.

There are many different kinds of fire. Our lives would be greatly altered without fire. Many of the comforts of life that we enjoy are the result of fire. Much of what we use, see, touch, or taste has been put to the fire.

But, have you ever been in a fire ... a sure enough physical, hot burning fire? Oh, the experience, both physically and mentally, of destruction, loss, fear, grief, pain, even the dreaded "what if's."

God uses fire throughout scripture to reveal Himself to us, to show us exactly how He uses fire in our lives, and how He will use fire when the Day of the Lord comes.

Moses saw the portrayal of God through the burning bush. Elijah rode on God's fiery chariot. King Nebuchadnezzar saw that man's fire has no power over God. Abraham saw God's fire consume his sacrifices. Sodom & Gomorrah saw the wrath of God through fire. The rich man saw the price that had to be paid with fire.

...For our God is a consuming fire. Hebrews 12:29

...From Heaven He made you hear His voice to discipline you. On earth He showed you his great fire, and you heard His words from out of the fire. Deuteronomy 4:36

...That the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perishes, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honor and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ. I Peter 1:7

...And whosoever was not found written in the book of life was cast into the lake of fire. Revelation 20:15

Yes, fire is a purifier. We must understand that God is the only channel through which one can be purified. Confessing our sins to the Lord is the only tool we have to gain the Refiner's fire. And, yes, fire will be used for judgment. Judgment on those who refuse to recognize and accept God's son in their lives. **You don't want to experience this type of fire.**

Whether you're watching the magnificent fireworks on the 4th of July, or walking through a devastating fire of despair, consider God's presence (or the absence thereof) in your life. Be encouraged. Remember the story of Shadrach, Meshach & Abednego in the fiery furnace. Daniel Chapter 3. They stood on their faith. Do you remember who was in the fire with them? The one whose name is Immanuel ... God with us.

I encourage you to read the entire 43rd chapter of Isaiah. "...thus saith the Lord that created thee ... and formed thee, Fear not: ... For I am the Lord thy God, the Holy One of Israel, thy Saviour."





This is the month during which we celebrate the 4th of July, the anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. As I pondered what to write for this month, I came to the realization that I have not actually read the Declaration of Independence since my school days. I decided to go through it again.

I found there are at least three direct references to God in this document, which was written in 1776. The first one occurs in the very first sentence:

"When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them."

In these words, the founding fathers acknowledge that there is indeed a God, that He rules over nature and its laws, and that He desires for His people to be free to worship Him. The second reference to God comes in the second sentence:



"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Note that the word "Creator" is capitalized. That makes it a proper name, which demonstrates that it is surely a reference to God. The document authors state again that the basis of establishing this new nation is God and his absolute authority to grant life and the conditions that come with it. The third allusion to the Almighty comes in the final paragraph, after a long list of the acts of tyranny put upon the colonists by the British monarchy:

"We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States."

The founding fathers clearly state that they have "appealed" (no doubt meaning "prayed") to the "Supreme Judge of the world". Again, note the capitalization of "Supreme Judge." They have asked God to guide them in their intentions, and they are convicted He has led them to declare this nation free of foreign control.

Upon reading this document, I don't see how anyone can misinterpret or distort the clear intention of our forefathers to establish that we are to acknowledge God as our leader, guide and dominant influence. Yet today Christians face a desperate fight to keep others from removing God from our schools, playing fields, government property, courtrooms, and general culture.

We can and must continue the fight to be "one nation under God". Our instructions were written for us long ago.



EDIBLE EDUCATION SPEAKER GIVES ADVICE FOR AVOIDING DEMENTIA

"Drink your milk," they said, "so you can grow up strong."

"Get some sunshine," they told us. "It'll help you feel better."

Turns out, "they" were right. Milk and sunshine both serve as important sources of Vitamin D, an essential for building strong bones and teeth. It also boosts the immune system.

But according to Charlie Goff, R.N., and executive director of Legacy Ridge at Trussville, Vitamin D is important for brain health, too. On June 13, Goff spoke at SAM's monthly Edible Education on preventing dementia, a subject of great concern to older adults and their families.

But not only is Vitamin D important, Goff said. Nutrition overall is a huge factor in maintaining brain health. He recommended eating anything fresh, especially greens, and avoiding processed foods with high amounts of sugar, salt, and fats. Refined sugar, artificial sugars, and certain food colorings can also be harmful.

Drinking plenty of water, said Goff, helps flush the toxins out of one's system. To give that Vitamin D factor a boost, he recommended eating eggs and fish, particularly salmon. Other dietary suggestions included olives and olive oil, avocado, mint, parsley, watermelon, and cucumber.

In addition to nutrition, Goff said that good sleep and exercise are critical to keeping the brain healthy. Exercising the brain with activities like working puzzles or reading is also recommended.

Silent, Yet Strong

This is the story of a man who was very quiet, but also very strong. He loved his country, his family and especially his God. I knew him well. This man was my father.

He was driven, always with a purpose and very stoic. His early life was not easy. Being the oldest of four children (one of whom had already passed at the age of 2), he made a decision after his father suddenly passed away at the age of 52, to withdraw from school to get a job and help support his mother and younger siblings. He was only 17.

He followed through with his plan and began working in the grocery business, a career he followed his entire life, with the exception of his time in the army during WWII. He was a hard-working man, always looking out for the well-being of others. That started early and continued during his military service as he became a sergeant in the army serving in WWII in the China-Burma-India theater. He never talked much about that period in his life. But I found a glimpse of him and how terribly hard that time really was when I found a letter he had written to his mother during his time there. The war definitely left its mark on him ... he became very quiet and remained that way the rest of his life.

Letter dated in November 1944

Dear Mom,

Do you think you can stand to read a few more lines of my scribbling ?? If so, then here it comes, but it will only be a short note as I'm about to run out of something to say - I received your letter of the 2nd yesterday and was surely glad to hear from you again - I have been getting quite a few letters from you lately, so keep up the good work, honey, cause I surely do love to read letters from you ... there was only one letter for my crew yesterday and that was one for me from you. So I guess I rate pretty high, eh???

There is a little more about life around there...and then he ends with this....

Sugar, I'm afraid this is not much of a letter but at least you know I am thinking of you and that I love you so very dearly - Be sweet and write when you can as your letters mean everything to me.

Bye for awhile ____ Your Son, Bill

Fast forward a few years to the time he met the love of his life, my mother. They, like so many others, had their ups and downs, but remained faithful to each other for almost 59 years, when my mother passed. They had 3 children. I'm the youngest of the 3.

My dad always wore starched shirts with tight collars when he worked because he wanted to be respected by his co-workers and show respect to his bosses. He did this for years. One story I always loved to hear my mother tell was that he rushed home from work EVERY day after I was born to pick me up and walk with me to the corner of our street and back home many times. Daddy made his profession of faith later in his life. I remember that day well. I was singing in the choir at the only church I had ever attended to that point, when I saw him and my brother walk down the aisle together with my mom by their side for support. It was one of the happiest days of my life.

I could go on and on about my "daddy". He was not perfect, but he was our dad. He loved all of us and we knew it even though he rarely said it aloud. And he was proud of all of us. We knew he was.

This was the story of a man who was very quiet, but also very strong. He loved his country, his family and especially his God.



2024 MEN ON MISSION

40th Annual Construction Project

For over 40 years, the men of First Baptist Trussville have been assisting other churches with construction projects. These projects usually consist of new sanctuaries, education spaces, or fellowship halls. The men have visited 18 states and traveled over 48,000 miles.

This year, the men traveled to Taylors, South Carolina, to help Camp Creek Baptist Church rebuild their sanctuary, which was destroyed in a fire last summer. Over the course of a week, 125 men representing over 22 churches in five states met in South Carolina, where they erected the sanctuary walls, trusses, roofing, and most of the electrical and plumbing. The Wednesday night service was held in the beginnings of the new sanctuary with over 150 in attendance.

These men bring a variety of skills, or lack thereof, but all look to be used by God. Some of these men have been on every trip, while for others, this was their first, but God uses them all. It was exciting to see how God will works through these men to minister to the community, not just for this week but for years to come.

In all we do, we give God the glory.



Thankfully it's here again! This year marks the 234th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration Of Independence. This is strictly an American holiday. That signing was responsible for giving us freedom and all the things which go with it, especially the freedom to worship as we each please. Raymond Culpepper and my current church pastor, Bro. Buddy Champion, and my Small Group Leader (aka SS), Charlie Philpot have had and continue to have a great influence on my Christian walk.

What is your favorite Bible verse:

Isaiah 40:31 "But those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint."

What ministries (at FBCT and elsewhere) are you involved in?

Higher Ground Jail & Prison Ministries, Christian Motorcyclists Association, SAM activities, and I fill in as a Sunday School teacher for Charlie when needed. I currently minister on a regular basis at Shelby County Jail, Coosa Valley Youth Detention facility in Anniston, and Jimmie Hale Mission.

Teaching and preaching the Word of God, particularly in the jails and prisons. Riding my motorcycle, cooking, and traveling with my wife.

Is there anything else you want people to know about you?
